

Clash of Titans Fury vs Usyk



The Battle for Undisputed Heavyweight Glory

On Saturday May 18th 2024, The Kingdom Arena in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia became the epicentre of the boxing world, hosting the first undisputed heavyweight world title fight in 25 years, the last being between Lennox Lewis and Evander Holyfield in Las Vegas in 1999. Forward twenty five years, this historic bout featured two undefeated titans, Tyson Fury from the UK with a record of 34-0-1, and Oleksandr Usyk from Ukraine standing at 21-0-0. For the first time in history, all four major heavyweight belts were on the line, adding an extra layer of anticipation and prestige to the event.

The build-up to the fight was intense, with both camps fiercely advocating for their fighters. As fight time approached, the atmosphere in the packed Kingdom Arena was electric, with celebrities and fans alike waiting with bated breath. The entrances of the boxers only heightened the excitement, setting the stage for an unforgettable night.

The bout began with Fury showcasing his trademark showboating, but Usyk managed to steal the first round with three solid shots in the last twenty seconds. The early rounds were closely contested, with both fighters demonstrating their exceptional ring craft. However, it was Fury who started to gain momentum in the mid rounds, particularly in round six. Fury's powerful body shots and a beautiful uppercut had Usyk in trouble, signaling a potential turning point in the fight.

But Usyk, known for his resilience and supreme fitness, began to turn the tide by round eight. Round nine was a spectacular display of Usyk's skill, as he had Fury reeling with a barrage of punches from all angles. Referee Mark Nelson gave Fury a standing ten count and the end of the round came as a welcome relief for Fury.

Fury managed to regain his composure, and while he fought valiantly, it was clear that Usyk was now in control. Despite Fury's spirited effort in the final round, the judges awarded Usyk a split decision victory. This win crowned Usyk as the new undisputed heavyweight champion of the world, making him only the second boxer in history to hold undisputed titles in both the cruiserweight and heavyweight divisions, alongside Evander Holyfield.

Adding to the historical significance, Usyk shares his birthday, January 17th, with Muhammad Ali, arguably the greatest boxer of all time. This coincidence fuels the debate about Usyk's place among boxing's elite, with many believing he is right up there with the greatest.

The boxing world now eagerly awaits the potential rematch, although it won't be for the undisputed title as Usyk is set to be stripped of his IBF belt. The overdue mandatory challenger, Filip Hrgovic, is set to face Daniel Dubois for the IBF title back in the Kingdom Arena in Riyadh on June 1st. This upcoming bout promises to add another exciting chapter to the heavyweight division.

In conclusion, the Fury vs Usyk fight was a magnificent contest between two masters of the ring, showcasing the very best of heavyweight boxing. Usyk's victory not only secured his legacy but also set the stage for future dramatic encounters within the heavyweight division.

PM HANDS OVER THE "TORCH OF COMMEMORATION" TO D-DAY VETERAN

Prime Minister Rishi Sunak began the commemorations for the 80th anniversary of D-Day as he handed the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's torch of commemoration to Naval D-Day veteran and LEBA member, Peter Kent. The ceremony to place on Tuesday 14th May at Horse Guards gate in Whitehall, London.

Mr Sunak was handed the torch, by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's (CWGC) director general Claire Horton, before passing it on to, 99-year-old Peter, in order for the torch to travel to many capital cities, key War Cemeteries, and memorials around the UK before crossing the channel with veterans for the official commemorations on June 6th in Normandy, France. The CWGC torch relay is intended to visually symbolise the passing down of the D-Day message through the generations with British Soldiers, Sailors, Household Division Horse guards & Horses, also many Cadets and CWGC volunteers attending the ceremony.



This torch will take centre stage in the CWGC's lighting up of more than 25,000 Commonwealth War Graves this summer.

Peter Kent has returned on many occasions, to past commemorations in France. He was a young 18yr old RN rating, in June 1944, his ship was part of the flotilla transporting soldiers, equipment and the construction of the 'Mulberry Harbour'. He has been one of many WW2 veterans that have been transported to the former battlefields by The London Taxi Charity for War Veterans annually. A volunteer fleet of London Cabbies drive the Vets and families from London to the town of Aramanche in Normandy, (all expenses picked up by the charity), for memorial events and visits to the War Grave Cemeteries, in honour of comrades who did not return. Another LEBA member and D-Day Veteran who hopes to make it over to France again for the 80th commemorations is 99-year-old Richard "Dicky" Forester, although both he and Peter's trip will be guided by health and age related problems, but, knowing these two stalwarts, they will give it their best shot.

All at LEBA wish them the best of luck and hope they make it, God Bless them!


After a stint in the Military, then the London Underground, Al settled into the Construction Industry.

Ray Cattouse former Southern Area and British Lightweight Champion

Ray from Balham in South London had a stellar career as an amateur and turned Pro in 1975 and was managed by Terry Lawless. He lost his debut fight on points to Barton McAllister but went on to win his next 18 fights earning him a shot at the Southern Area Lightweight which he won, and the fight was also an eliminator for the British Title

In March 1980 Ray fought Dave McCabe for the British Lightweight Title and stopped him in the 8th round to become the British Champion and a year later defended it against McCabe this time stopping him in the 15th round

Ray challenged Giuseppe Gibilisco for his European Title in 1982, in Italy and it was a great fight which had it been in the UK Ray would have won by a "Country Mile" but it was in Italy and the decision was a draw!!!!

Later that year Ray made the second defence of his British Title against George Feeney but unfortunately was stopped in the 14th round only the second defeat of his Pro career and he was ahead on points going into the 14th round. The fight was celebrated as the "Fight of the Year".

In the annuls of British Boxing, few names resonate with the echo of perseverance and triumph like Ray Cattouse. Born on 24th July 1952 in Balham Ray's journey from a local hopeful to a national champion encapsulates the spirit of a bygone era in our sport. His career, marked by a blend of skill, determination, and an indomitable will, has left an indelible mark on the British Lightweight division, a testament to Ray's heart and the respect he commanded from fans, his opponents and the Peers of British Boxing

Sadly, he passed away peacefully in his sleep on May $15^{\rm th}$ after an illness, our condolences to his family, friends and his long-term partner Shirley. Rest in Peace Champ.
